FROM OUR STUDENT RABBI:

Dear Friends,

As the days grow seemingly darker, colder, and shorter, it is easy to become fatigued and even depressed. Our tradition, like so many others offers a holiday during this the time. Hanukkah falls each year on the 25th of Kislev, this year, which happens to correspond with December 20th, and of course lasts for eight days and nights.

Many of us can recall Hanukkah rituals from our childhood. Perhaps these memories including lighting the menorah, playing dreidel, cooking and eating potato latkes or sufganiyot (jelly doughnuts), exchanging gifts, and singing Hanukkah songs. All of these rituals help to create a celebratory atmosphere amidst a season of darkness. Yet, sadly, many of us do not recall exactly what it is that we are celebrating.

The old adage holds true: *They tried to kill us, we won, let's eat!* However, Hanukkah is about so much more! The onions with which we make our potato latkes serve as a metaphor for the meanings behind the holiday of Hanukkah. The history and rationale for why it is that we celebrate Hanukkah each year, has many layers.

Probably, the outermost layer of the various rationales for Hanukkah lies in the story of the oil in the Temple. We learn from the Talmud (Shabbat, 21b) that directly after the Macabees defeated the Greek-Syrian army, and began to rededicate the Temple, they only had enough oil to light the menorah for one day, yet the oil lasted for eight entire days. This is a beautiful story with a very happy ending, and certainly a great reason to celebrate.

If one were to peel the layers of the onion off, however, he/she would discover that there is much more to the story of Hanukkah. The story of Hanukkah is actually a historical story about a power struggle amongst Jews with different ideologies. It's a story about the battle for what different groups believed to be "right".

All too often, when we engage in debates, we place moral judgments upon people who disagree with our own points of view, thereby making the debates "battles". The rabbis were uncomfortable with the notion that Jews would have to battle one another. So, they gave the story a happy twist – the story of the oil. Perhaps, this twist was assigned to the holiday of Hanukkah to revise the holiday's message. Rather than remem-
